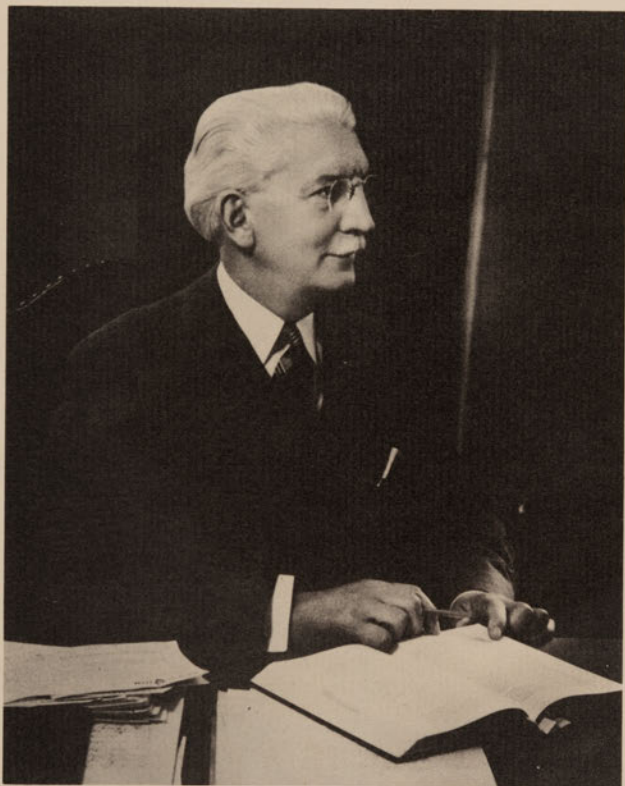
On a sort of academic Lend-Lease arrangement it was my privilege to serve with Capt. Reed M. Fawell on his famous Ship Ashore during its entire war assignment. Through six semesters we remained on duty for a consecutive total of more than five thousand hours. Every day we manned our battle stations, constantly on the alert for danger. My assigned duty was curricular coordination involving a stretching of the mental muscles to include small knowledges and large concerns about everything from Mycology and Vector Analysis to Analytical Mechanics and French Phonetics. More important still was the acquisition of sufficient agility to keep one jump ahead of several thousand of the keenest young minds ever geared to maximum operation.

I have presented innumerable examples from literature and real life of men and women who have lived richly, vigorously and sanely. Now through two years of most exacting war-time responsibilities I have witnessed the constant functioning of a consistent integrity. I sincerely believe in the Contagion of Personality. Fawell as Commanding Officer failed to catch from him the fine spirit, rare good judgment and infallible sense of fair play of a distinguished officer and a real gentleman.

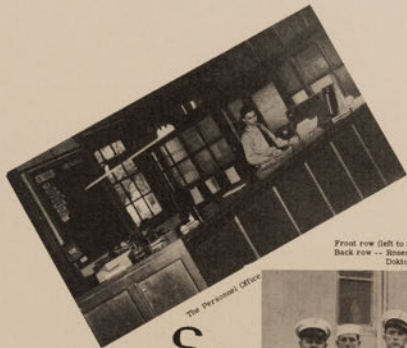
## OUR UNIT

Our unit, founded in 1940 on the campus of the University of Southern California, by Captain Reed M. Fawell USN (Ret.) is one of which we are justly proud. Since the first days of the unit when Capt. Fawell had to recruit cadets from the freshman class to the present day our graduates have gone forth as officers well aware that they knew all that could be taught from books prior to sea experience and fully confident that their officer instructors had given them a true picture of the Navy.

The "Fighting Top" is the honorary social organization of the Naval R.O.T.C. Unit of the University of Southern California. Its primary motive is to initiate and carry out social functions for the members of the unit, and to appropriate the funds with which to procure those little conveniences that are too often overlooked, but sorely missed, that go toward making a barracks cheerful. Among their services are the care and maintenance of the coke, candy, and cigarette machines.

The Fighting Top, though a social organization, carries out its functions and tasks in strict accordance with the code of Naval Etiquette that every young officer is required to observe, thus also giving the cadets an opportunity to learn Naval Etiquette through actual application of it.

Membership in this organization is limited to fifty members who are se-

lected from all cadets submitting petitions. By this means, an active membership is insured, for only men submitting petitions are considered and from their ranks only the men most actively interested are selected.

Each term is highlighted by a formal dance, held exclusively for cadets, at one of the local country clubs. In alternate semesters the dance is the "Ring Dance" for first classmen. At the start of each semester the Fighting Top also holds an informal "Dig" in the lounge of the E.V.K. Hall. This gives the lower classmen the golden opportunity to meet the Co-eds of the University.

At the end of each semester, the Fighting Top Stag is held at which the graduating first classmen bid their fond farewell to the members of the lower classes and the calander of events for the approaching semester is discussed.

Starting unusually strong, the cardinal and gold beat UCLA, California and St. Marys' Preflight in the first three games. Everyone was beginning to talk about another Rose Bowl game for the Trojans.

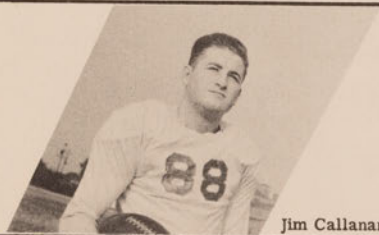
Then San Diego Naval Training Station stunned football observers by beating SC 33 to 6. College of Pacific was an easy victim the following week, losing 52 to 0 to the men of Troy, but Washington and St. Marys both earned victories over the Trojan team on the following two Saturdays.

By this time all Rose Bowl hopes were smothered. The Trojans retained only a mathematical chance of playing in the coveted Arroyo Seco saucer on New Year's day. Washington, the favorite, was beaten by Washington State in an upset, however, and the conference race was thrown into a muddle.

Heartened by the turn of events, the Trojans came fighting back and inflicted successive beatings on California, Oregon State, and UCLA, to win the conference title and get the Rose Bowl bid for the third straight year.

Alabama was chosen as the Trojan's opponents for the New Year's day battle.

A six to nothing loss to UCLA's Brubabes in the final game of the season and a six to six tie in the first game were the only blemishes on the record of a military-bolstered JV football team.

Aside from these two mixes with their cross-town rivals, the Spartan outfit won their games handily.

Two year lettermen Fred Burnett, V-12 trainee; Bob Mix, V-12 trainee; Bill Schubert, NRO; and Bob Barone, NRO, carried the major burden of responsibility as the team hung up its fine record.

Burnett gained plenty of yardage from halfback while the other three men were linemen. Barone saw action with the varsity team also but was benched during the season with an injury and assumed assistant managerial duties for the remaining games.

Other trainees on the team were Vaughn Phelps, halfback; Jim Fenton, end; Frank Bruner, halfback; George Anderson, quarterback; Fred Davis, end; Bob Aiken, halfback; Bob Henderson, halfback; Brit Brown, halfback; D.V. McCloskey, Willie Kerr, fullback, and Art Heger, fullback.

# The Rose Bowl Story

A fired-up Alabama football team all but erased the memory of a long standing Southern California record of never having been beaten in the Rose Bowl, by gaining an easy, decisive 34 to 14 victory over the Trojans on New Year's day, 1946.

Eight times the cardinal and gold gridders had won in the big saucer, the victories being strung out over a period of 23 years.

The extended SC victory string began in 1923 when Penn State bowed, 14 to 3. It survived several close calls, foremost of which was the famous last minute Trojan victory over Duke in the 1929 classic.

Beaten three times by Caltech and once by City College, the 1945 Trojan tracksters experienced too much difficulty in trying to maintain traditional SC track supremacy over all challengers.

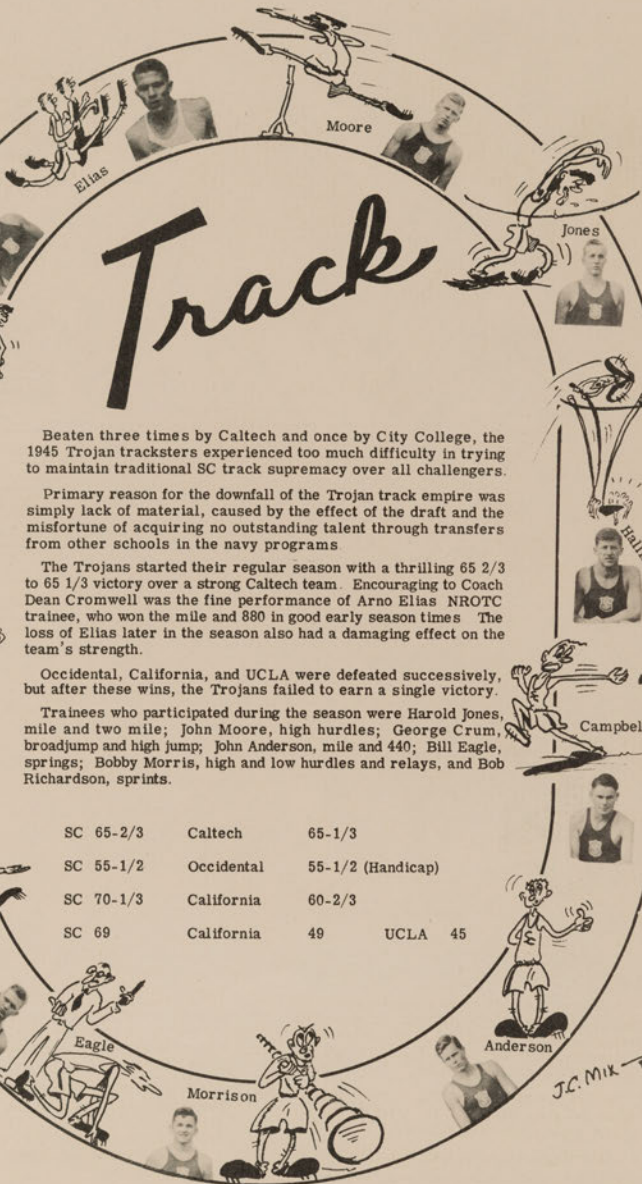
Primary reason for the downfall of the Trojan track empire was simply lack of material, caused by the effect of the draft and the misfortune of acquiring no outstanding talent through transfers from other schools in the navy programs

The Trojans started their regular season with a thrilling 65 2/3 to 65 1/3 victory over a strong Caltech team. Encouraging to Coach Dean Cromwell was the fine performance of Arno Elias NROTC trainee, who won the mile and 880 in good early season times. The loss of Elias later in the season also had a damaging effect on the team's strength.

Occidental, California, and UCLA were defeated successively, but after these wins, the Trojans failed to earn a single victory.

Trainees who participated during the season were Harold Jones, mile and two mile; John Moore, high hurdles; George Crum, broadjump and high jump; John Anderson, mile and 440; Bill Eagle, sprints; Bobby Morris, high and low hurdles and relays, and Bob Richardson, sprints.

Trainees were the backbone of SC's Southern California Collegiate Championship golf team.

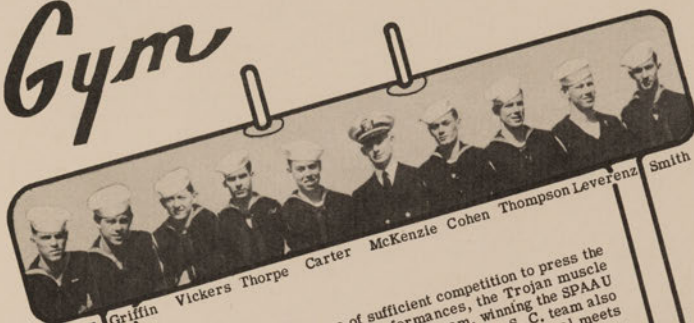

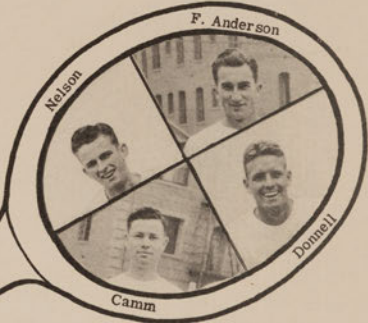

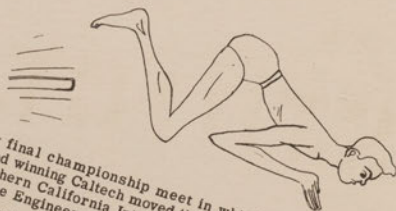


Joe Bruin from crosstown was the only collegiate tennis foe to beat the Trojans of 1945 but they did it twice, taking the conference title over the second place Trojans.

Anderson, Camm, Moore, and Nelson were other Trainees who saw action during the season.

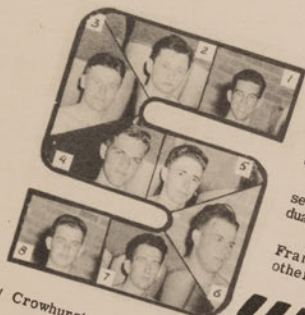

Paced by redheaded Wes Compere, undefeated throughout the season in the 440 and 220 yard sprints, the swimmers won five dual meets as against one loss.

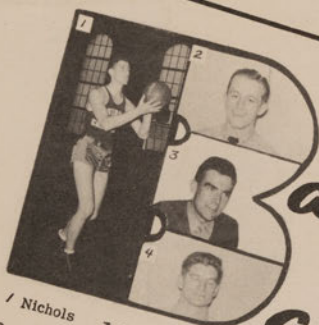

Jack Nichols, star center, was then injured and Ernie Filibertie and Tom Shanley, starting

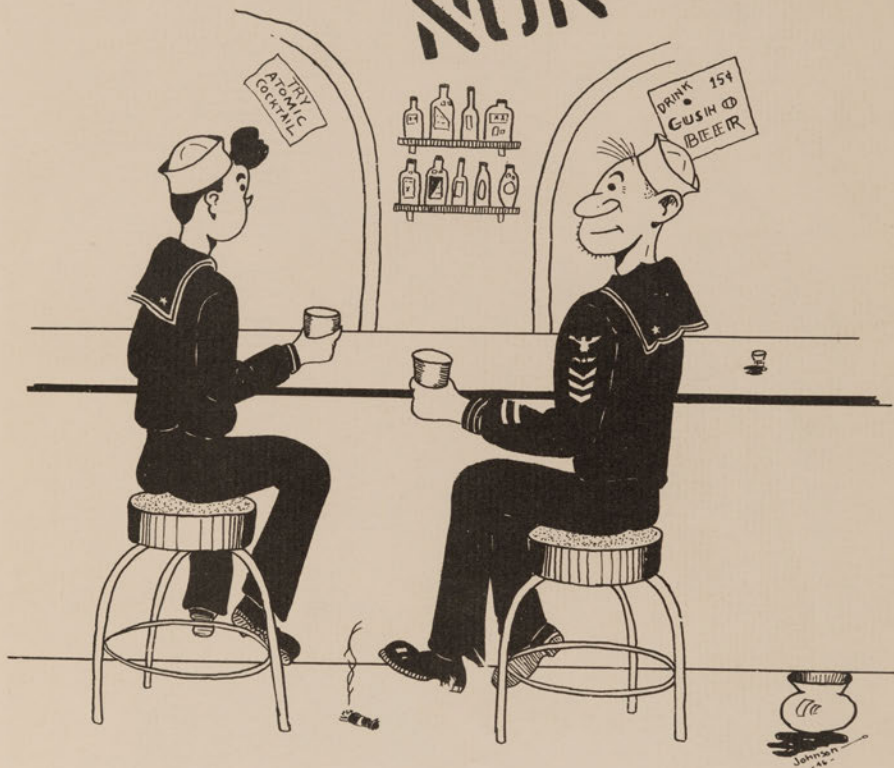
guards, were bedded with the flu, and the casabamen dropped three straight games.
