# TROJANS GIVE BACK

## 2026 NJROTC SUPERBOWL VOLUNTEERING

On February 21, midshipmen and active duty staff from the Trojan Battalion traveled to Santa Ana High School to assist with the NJROTC Area 21 Super Bowl. The following week, on February 28, they supported the NJROTC Area 22 Super Bowl at El Camino Real Charter High School. Both weeks, from early morning until the hot afternoon, high school JROTC cadets from across Southern California participated in various competitive events, testing their physical fitness through curl-ups, push-ups, and sprint relays, uniform appearance in a personnel inspection, proficiency in armed and unarmed drill, and knowledge in an academic test. USC NROTC's mission was to assist the host schools in the efficient execution of these competitions.

At Santa Ana, Col Tracy Perry served as the head judge for the personnel inspection, with LT Cobarruvias joining as an additional judge. At El Camino Real, CDR Buschor held the role of head judge for personnel inspection. At both competitions, SSgt Arzate served as a judge for the unarmed and armed regulation drill events. MIDN served as judges in a variety of roles, from assistants on the exhibition drill pads, to grading the cadets' form while conducting push-ups and curl-ups, to proctoring the academic test.

## USC MARSHALL EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING CENTER

On February 26, 2026, the Trojan Battalion had the opportunity to attend the USC Marshall School of Business's Experiential Learning Center (ELC) during PROLAB. The ELC, per the Marshall website, "is a behavioral laboratory that enables students to learn critical management skills by participating in 'business-like' activities. Topics covered include group decision-making, problem solving, making presentations, and business negotiations just to name a few. Students learn by actively engaging in ELC activities and receiving immediate feedback by reviewing their recorded interactions."

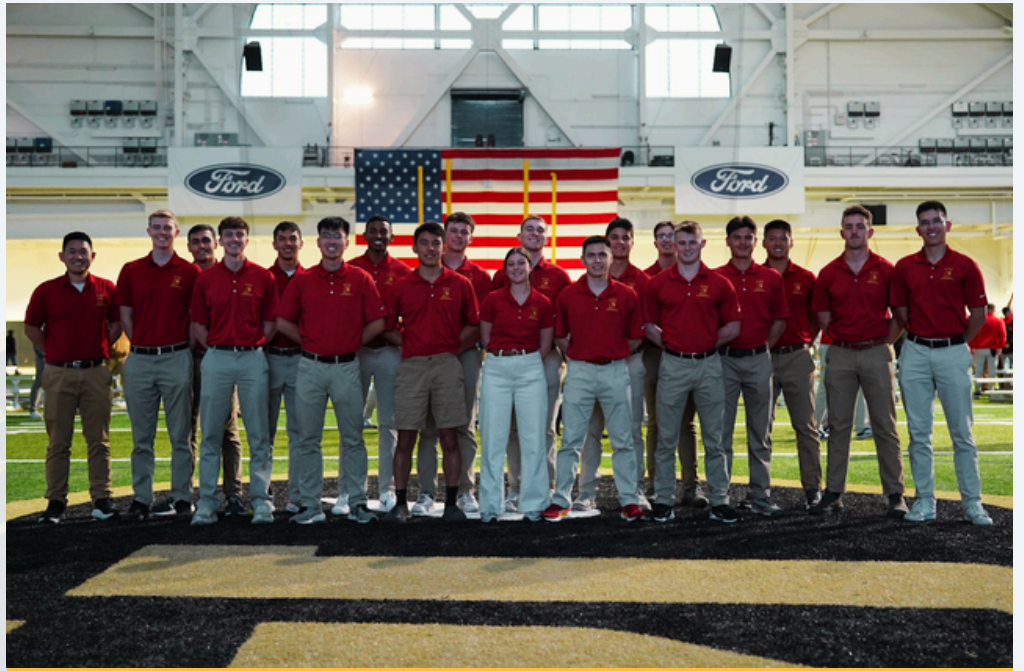

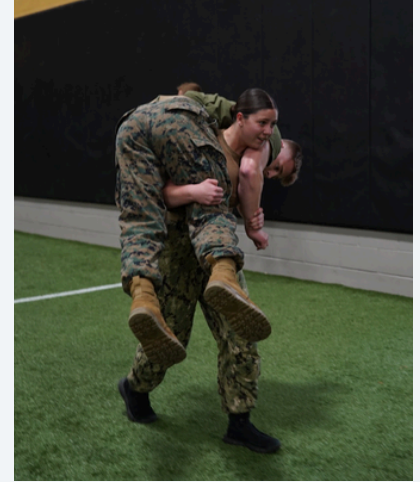
## IRON 4/C: MIDN 4/C FILIBEN, HOLLEY, TURK, WHITE

The Iron 4/C event began with a push-up portion, in which MIDN completed as many push-ups as they could by the end of the two-minute timer. This was immediately followed by multiple repetitions of a circuit comprised of 30 push-ups, followed by calisthenics such as flutter kicks, squats, and crunches.

The second portion proved to be tough, with ammo can lifts followed by buddy carries. The event concluded with a max set of pull-ups for each MIDN.

The participants' preparation for the event was primarily conducted individually, yet the intensity of their preparatory efforts allowed them to thrive during the competition itself. Leading up to the event, MIDN 4/Cs Filliben, Holley, Turk, and White focused on their short burst running endurance to prepare for the circuit portion of the event. The Navy options were also taught how to properly buddy carry prior to the event.

The Trojan Battalion earned 4th place in the event. Reflecting on the team's performance, MIDN Filliben



said, "I feel extremely proud of my team for performing to the best of their abilities." Congratulations and Bravo Zulu to all competitors!

The USC NROTC shooting team is grateful to the alumni league for funding live-fire practices leading up to the competition. In preparation, the team conducted three live-fire training days using both the M1911 pistol platform and the M4 carbine. These sessions allowed MIDN to become more familiar with the shooting sequence and improve their recoil management.

Although the team did not place in the competition, they gained valuable experience and lessons learned, and are motivated to return stronger and better prepared in the future.

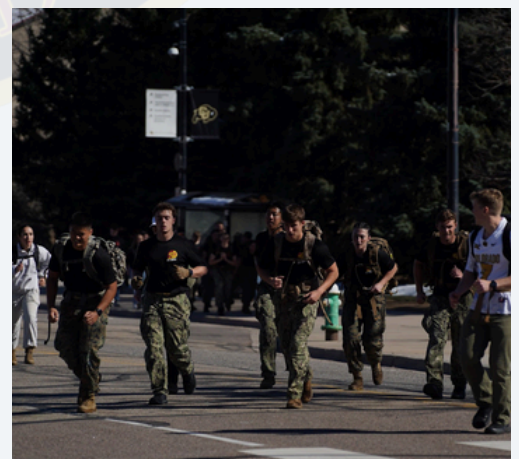

In preparation for the Colorado Drill Meet, the Color Guard drill team met weekly to practice the required movements and refine the provided drill card sequence. Each session focused on building synchronization, sharpening commands, and improving overall precision as a team. Once the team felt confident in their performance, they coordinated with a Color Sergeant, connected through SSgt Arzate, who observed the routine and provided constructive feedback to help them improve.

On the day of the competition, the team gathered for a final practice before stepping onto the drill field to perform for the judges. The experience of training consistently over time and then executing the routine in front of drill instructors fostered a strong sense of confidence, discipline, and attention to detail within the team. By the end, the process had not only strengthened their technical performance but also reinforced the importance of teamwork and composure under pressure.

# GUEST SPEAKER: U.S. NAVY CDR MEGHAN GRAY

On March 12, the Trojan Battalion got to hear from USC NROTC alumna CDR Meghan Gray during PROLAB. CDR Gray is a Surface Warfare Officer who commissioned in 2007, earning a degree in Geological Sciences with a minor in Environmental Engineering. She has served in multiple operational roles at sea, including aboard the USS *San Jacinto*, USS *Preble*, and USS *Hopper*, with experience spanning combat systems, anti-submarine warfare, and operations leadership. Her deployments have included the Mediterranean, Indo-Pacific, and Arabian Gulf, supporting carrier strike group operations and ballistic missile defense missions. Ashore, she earned a master's degree in National Security Affairs and has served in key planning and training roles, including at U.S. Naval Central Command. She currently serves as Commanding Officer of USS *Charleston* (LCS-18), after previously serving as the ship's Executive Officer.

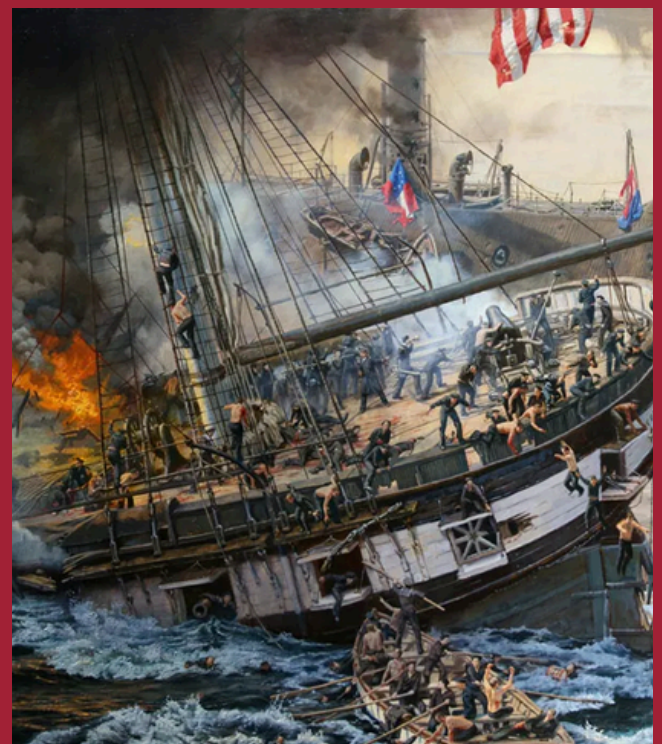
She spoke about the lessons she has learned throughout her career and gave advice to current MIDN about how to best take advantage of their time in NROTC. A tip that stood out to MIDN 4/C Holley was the concept that the habits you develop as a MIDN play into the basis of the officer you become. ## THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

### THE BATTLE OF HAMPTON ROADS, 1862

In March 1862, during the Civil War, the Battle of Hampton Roads marked a revolutionary shift in naval warfare as the ironclads USS *Monitor* and CSS *Virginia* (formerly the CSS *Merrimack*) fought the first-ever duel between armored warships. Just one day prior, the *Virginia* had devastated Union wooden ships, proving how vulnerable traditional fleets had become. When the *Monitor* arrived, the two ironclads engaged in a fierce but ultimately indecisive battle, unable to significantly damage one another. Though tactically a draw, the engagement signaled the end of the era of wooden warships almost overnight and ushered in a new age of armored, steam-powered naval combat.

## NEW TROJAN BATTALION OFFICER INSTRUCTORS

### CDR ALEXANDER BUSCHOR EXECUTIVE OFFICER (XO)

CDR Alex “Road Trip” Buschor, reported aboard as the new Executive Officer of the NROTC Los Angeles Consortium. CDR Buschor is from Long Island, NY. He graduated from the State University of New York at Ononta in 2008. After the completion of Officer Candidate School (OCS), he was designated as a Naval Flight Officer in December 2010. CDR Buschor’s first deployment was with VAW-117 on the USS *NIMITZ* (CVN 68) flying the E-2C Hawkeye. After a shore tour as an instructor in the E-2C and E-2D, he deployed on the USS *THEODORE ROOSEVELT* (CVN 71) as a “Shooter” (Catapult and Arresting Gear Officer). CDR Buschor next reported to VX-30 in early 2021 as a department head while flying E-2Ds, P-3Cs, NP-3Ds and KC-130Ts on worldwide missions. His most recent assignment was the Officer in Charge (OIC) of San Nicolas Island in Ventura County. He is a published author and is working on a PhD in History.



### LT ISABELLA COBARRUVIAS OFFICER INSTRUCTOR

LT Isabella Cobarruvias is the newest Officer Instructor (OI) at USC NROTC. She is from Oakdale, CA, and attended the University of California, San Diego. She earned a B.S. in Marine Biology and commissioned in 2021 through the NROTC San Diego Consortium as a Surface Warfare Officer. Through her time in the fleet, LT Cobarruvias has successfully completed two division officer tours. The first in Pearl Harbor, HI onboard USS *WILLIAM P. LAWRENCE* (DDG 110) as the Auxiliary Officer and then in San Diego, CA onboard USS *CANBERRA* (LCS 30) as the Navigator.

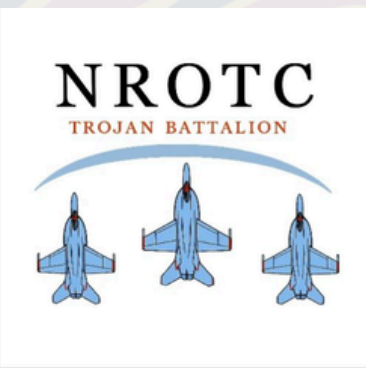
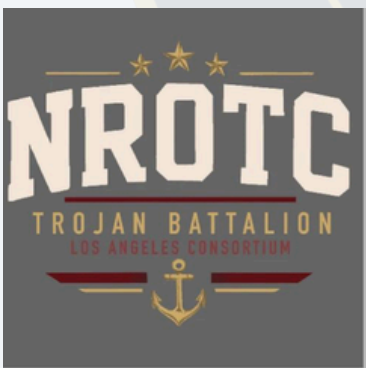
# NEW NROTC TROJAN BATTALION GEAR STORE!

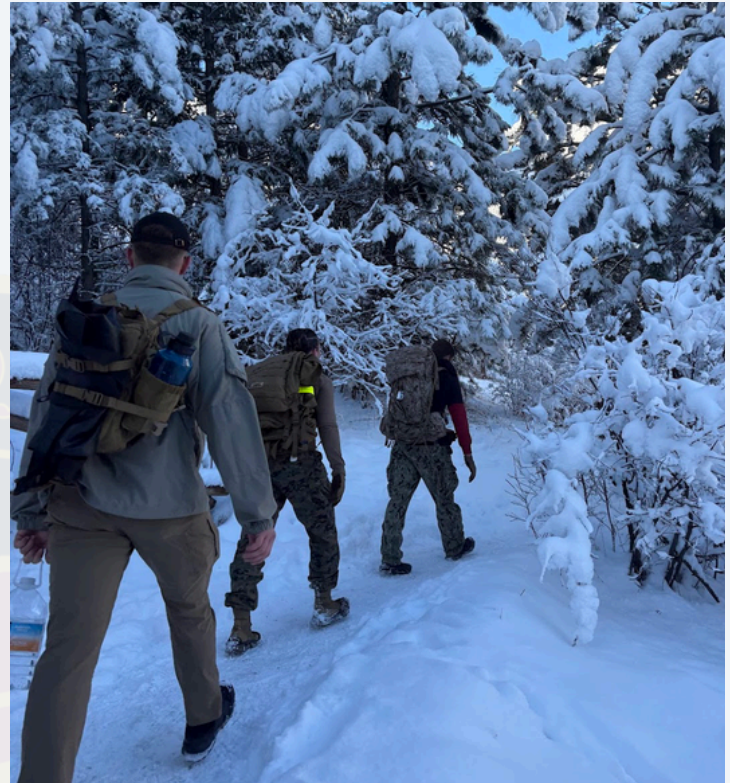
